

A Brief History of the New Utrecht Reformed Church

Early Dutch Settlement

New Utrecht Reformed Church (the Old Dutch Reformed Church at New Utrecht) began with Dutch settlers meeting to pray sometime in the 1650's in the town of New Utrecht and was incorporated as a congregation on 1677, the year that marks the official beginnings of the church. The Dutch settlers had their first burial in 1654 which gave birth to the New Utrecht cemetery, the oldest cemetery in Brooklyn.

An octagonal church building was constructed in 1700 next to the cemetery on the corner of 84th and 16th Ave. Ballasts from Dutch trade ships were used to build the church.

In 1828 the church was moved to 18th and 84th street, its present site and reconstructed as a rectangular building in order to hold more people. The same ballasts were used for the second building. Some of the ballasts have visible markings that read "IHS – 1700"

Prior to the church's re-building at 18th Ave, the site served as a private boy's academy which was visited by George Washington. Excavations in 2003 under the front of the sanctuary revealed the walls of classrooms, Spanish gold coins, a chamber pot and silver utensils. The excavations were conducted by the Archeology department of Brooklyn College and were featured in the New York Times.

The Role of New Utrecht Church: American Revolutionary War and Civil War

New Utrecht Reformed Church played a significant role in both the American Revolutionary War and the Civil War. The original church building was captured by the British in the Battle of Long Island during the American Revolutionary War and served as a military hospital to hundreds of British and American soldiers. The original rooster weathervane of the church was used as target practice by the soldiers who riddled the weathervane with bullets. Many of the key players during the Battle of Long Island received medical treatment and succumbed to their injuries in the sanctuary of the New Utrecht Church. They are buried in the New Utrecht Church cemetery and include some of the most prominent families in Brooklyn. Among most famous soldiers who succumbed of injuries during that battle was General Woodhull, for whom the Woodhull Hospital and Woodhull section of Brooklyn is named. He is buried at the New Utrecht Reformed Church cemetery and a memorial to him is prominent on the 84th Street side of the cemetery near the corner closest to the Metropolitan Baptist Church.

When the English finally evacuated Brooklyn on November 25, 1783, the Betsy Ross flag was then raised for the first time in Brooklyn at the new Utrecht Reformed Church site. The New Utrecht Liberty Pole Society has preserved and maintained the Liberty Pole as a historic site. The active flag pole is the sixth in succession from the first in 1783, the sixth and last being installed during World War II.

The Friends of Historic New Utrecht was formed in the mid 1990's to preserve the sanctuary and the Parish House as historic sites. Among its initial and key activities has been the development of an impressive educational program for local elementary, middle and high school students and gives presentations and tours to more than a thousand students each year. The Friends of Historic New Utrecht continues its mission today to preserve the historic contribution of the New Utrecht Church and the last vestige of 17th and 18th century life in Brooklyn through the historic remembrance of the Town of New Utrecht.

The New Utrecht Reformed Church organized and sponsored from among its members a regiment of local militia to support the efforts of the Union Army during the Çivil War the New York State Militia, Company H 14th Brooklyn Regiment served the Union Army throughout the Civil War.

Today the New York State Militia, Company H 14th Brooklyn Regiment lives on as a group of several dozen dedicated volunteers serve as a re-enactment troop emulating and preserving the historic significance of the 14th Regiment, Company H.

The group practices its marches and routines weekly and participate almost every weekend in Civil War re-enactments in the tri-state area and as far away as the New England states north and Virginia to the south.

Dutch Yields to Italian Influence

By the late 1800's, services at the church in Dutch yielded to services in English. An overwhelming emigration of Italian immigrant workers took place over a twenty year period (beginning in 1920) which began to transform the town of New Utrecht into an Italian dominant community. A response to the emigration and the needs of this newly arrived immigrant community, an Italian mission was founded by New Utrecht Church. The first Italian worship was held in 1947. An Italian Pentecostal minister was recruited to serve the congregation. He later became a part of the Reformed Church in America and the Classis of Brooklyn.

The remnant of the Italian mission church, which yielded to English speaking services sometime in the mid 1950's, is what constitutes the leadership of New Utrecht Church today. Italian families with Protestant ties, married Catholic families and these interdenominational marriages, pre-Vatican II, took place in New Utrecht Church, without the blessing of the Catholic Church. Catholics began worshipping at New Utrecht and raising their children Protestant. However, in an Italian Catholic dominant neighborhood most

of the Protestant children of these Italian Catholic – Protestant families, married Catholic Italians (now post Vatican II, where such marriages were permitted in the Catholic Church) and these new married couples raised their children Catholic. This practice brought an end to passing on church membership generation to generation. Substantial church growth came to a halt with the raising of Catholic grandchildren in the 1960's – 1990's.

Asian Influence at New Utrecht

In the early 1990's, with the emerging Asian communities planting roots in Bensonhurst, New Utrecht Reformed Church seeded a Chinese community church funded and affiliated with the American Baptist Church and a Korean Church, the Mirral Church (meaning "little seed") founded in 1981.

The Chinese Community Church of Bensonhurst

The Chinese Community Church of Bensonhurst was founded in by the American Baptist Church at the New Utrecht Reformed Church. The Chinese Church enjoyed a great growth in the late 1990's launching services in Mandarin, Cantonese and an English youth service. The church left New Utrecht in the early 2000's after an eleven year relationship. The congregation built a building four blocks away on 18th Ave and continues extensive growth. The Chinese are the fastest growing immigrant group in Bensonhurst.

The Mirral Church

For the first few years, under the leadership of Rev. Moses Lee, the Mirral Church was affiliated with the Reformed Church as a mission of the Classis of Brooklyn. With the installation of a young new pastor in the fall of 1994, Rev. Young Min Kim, a Swendenborgiann trained and ordained minister, the Mirral Church affiliated with the Swendenborgian Church. It is today one of two Swedenborgian Churches in NYC and it is believed to be the only Korean Swedenborgian Church in the world.

Despite denominational differences, the New Utrecht Church and the Mirral Church celebrate joint communion services including Maundy Thursday, Easter and Christmas Eve services and enjoy informal fellowship and holiday celebrations. Discussions of merging the congregations and sharing ministers occurred in the mid 2000's, but have since faded. A Korean Senior Citizens Center, affiliated with the NYC Korean Senior Citizen Council was encouraged by Rev. Kim and opened in 1998. The senior citizens center flourishes however, feeling pushed out of Bensonhurst by other emerging Asian immigrants, the thriving Korean immigrant community of the 1990's has faded. The church is currently contemplating relocating its ministry to Flushing, Queens were a larger Korean community is located.

Russian Influence at New Utrecht

By 1995 it was clear that a significant number of newly arrived Russian immigrants, who originally settled in Brighton Beach and Manhattan Beach had migrated to Bensonhurst. Prayers for a Russian speaking pastor were answered one Sunday when a Latvian refugee couple walked into the narthex of the church one day, asking to start a Christian service in Russian. The Reverend Ganady Zavaly, a Baptist minister and seminary professor from Latvia and is bi-lingual spouse, Helen, felt called to seed a Russian speaking congregation. The missionary couple were sponsored by the Christian and Missionary Alliance Church. After discussions with the local leadership of the Christian and Missionary Alliance church, a Saturday and Sunday evening Russian worshipping community was born. Today, more than 200 people worship each Sunday evening at 5 PM. The church baptized over 300 people in its first ten years of mission and founded satellite missions in Coney Island and in Staten Island.

Latin Americans at New Utrecht

In 2001, after the tragic events of 9/11 and growing intolerance of new immigrants, New Utrecht Church hosted the organizing meetings for what was to become the Bay Parkway Job Center, a place where undocumented and non-English speaking immigrants could go to find day work in the construction industry. The church was instrumental in negotiating the site with the City of New York, helped fund the initial set up of the site, with help from First Reformed Church in Rock Rapids, Iowa. For the next few years, New Utrecht organized local churches to provide bread each morning to the day laborers. These day laborers now constitute a fast growing new immigrant community in Bensonhurst!

Current Ministries at New Utrecht Church

Today New Utrecht hosts a myriad of civic, cultural, youth and immigrant based ministries including: The Mirral Church, The Russian House of Prayer, The Korean Senior Citizens Center, Alcoholics Anonymous and Al-Anon, Friends of Historic New Utrecht, Brooklyn 14th Regiment Company H, New York State Militia, The New Utrecht Liberty Pole Association, Boy Scout Troop 20 and Pack 20, New Utrecht Girl Scout Troop, The Inter School Orchestra Band Concert Series, English as a Second Language program.


